## EBay Savvy Friend Needed

The Friends of the Morgan Hill Library are looking for a volunteer to sell occasional items on EBAY. We try to sell everything on AMAZON, but infrequently have donations that just aren't suitable for selling on AMAZON. They may be old, rare books, art posters, or more recently, Beatles memorabilia.

Ideally the volunteer would already have experience selling on EBAY. The volunteer job would involve researching the item to determine a price, assessing and describing the condition of the item in detail, taking photos, listing the item on EBAY and monitoring sales, answering questions from prospective buyers and eventually, mailing the sold item. This job will involve relatively infrequent sales, but once you list something, you will need to be available to follow through on the sale.

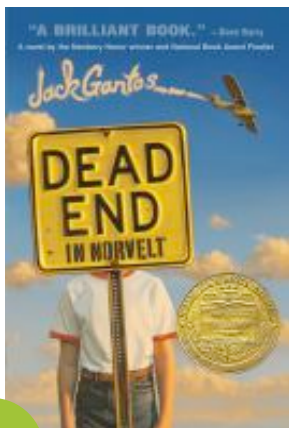


### Recommended Reading:

Every once in a while I read a book just to read something I would not normally pick up. Even though I do read science fiction and fantasy, I haven't been interested in vampires, werewolves, and other supernatural beings since watching the old movies with Bela Lugosi, Lon Chaney, and the funny spin offs with Abbott and Costello. I knew I desperately needed some updating with the popularity of the Stephenie Meyer's Twilight series, the Sookie Stackhouse series by Charlaine Harris, which had been made into the hit TV series True Blood, and too many others to name.



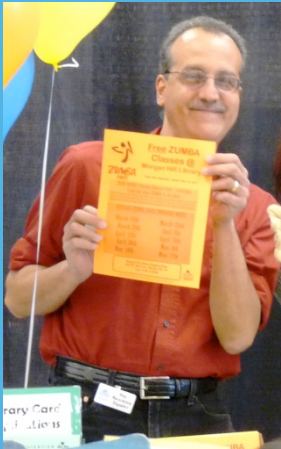
The *Last Werewolf* by Glen Duncan is a literary tale that (and here is the warning label) uses crude language, is intensely dark and violent, yet is vividly engaging. The story unravels from 200 year old werewolf Jacob Marlowe's point of view when he has decided to commit suicide and end his race. As the story progresses, the reasons for his despair and what life as a werewolf is like unfold. Even though there are many things about Jacob's life that are abhorrent, he becomes a sympathetic character that is as captivating as he is repugnant. On a completely different track, I always read the new Newbery Award winner, which is the American Library Association's pick of the best-written book for children. *Dead End in Norvelt* by Jack Gantos is laugh out loud funny. It follows a character named Jack Gantos and a town that is filled with zany characters. Jack is grounded for the summer, yet manages to have one wacky adventure after another. I was lucky enough to have met the real Jack Gantos a few years ago, and he showed me his childhood diary that had a flattened road-killed rat pressed in the pages. So as I read this book about the fictional Jack and knowing something about the real Jack, I wondered how many of the stories were really autobiographical.

**Ray Melendez** works at the Morgan Hill Library as a part-time bilingual staff member. He has served our community's Spanish-speakers since 2008. For the past several years, Ray's salary has been paid for by the Friends, as one of those "extras" that are not part of the library budget.

Ray works at the reference desk every Wednesday evening and does the Saturday morning bilingual story time. His services are well utilized. Last year alone, he answered 1,297 questions using his Spanish speaking skills.

In addition to Morgan Hill, Ray works full time in the Monterey County library system in Salinas, where he has been since 1987.

Ray was born in Manhattan but spent some of his early years in Puerto Rico. He is married with two children, one grandchild, a dog, a cat and a cockatiel. He loves volleyball, running, sports, dancing, reading, listening to music (salsa and oldies) and books on tape (especially on his long commute from his home in Fremont). His favorite book is *The Three Musketeers* by Alexander Dumas. His favorite phrase is "Don't worry, be happy."

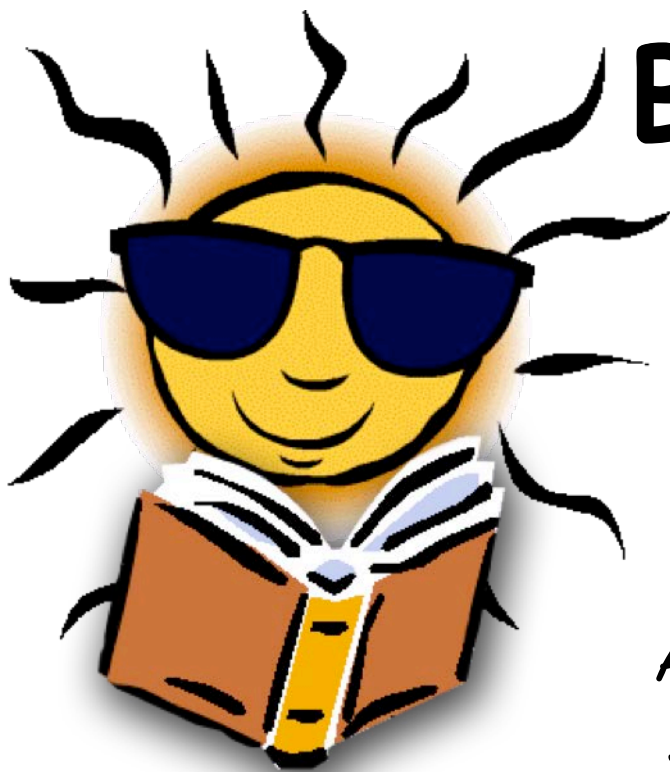

We have been able to provide our library with \$3,000 for adult and teen bestsellers, \$1,500 for Children's Programming, and \$2,200 in teen programs.
